

Dr. Barbara Haas	Surviving or Thriving: Long-Term Outcomes Following Severe Traumatic Injury
	While the majority of injured patients survive their injuries, they are often left with significant and permanent physical, cognitive and psychological sequelae. This presentation will review the burden of disability among survivors of severe injury, and approaches acute care providers can consider to improve long-term outcomes among their patients.
Dr. Carolyn Snider &	The Spectrum of Prevention: Redefining the Trauma System Role
Brandy Tanenbaum	Hospital is the epicentre of the injury disease process. Unlike infectious and chronic disease care pathways, trauma care does not yet actively include robust prevention screening and intervention protocols. Injury is treated as a discrete event and this gap in system design and philosophy perpetuates high recidivism as the injury disease progresses. Evidence supports standard practice aimed at reducing individual and social risk factors for injury along the prevention spectrum. This session will address the need for hospital-based prevention strategies with examples of working violence intervention programming.
